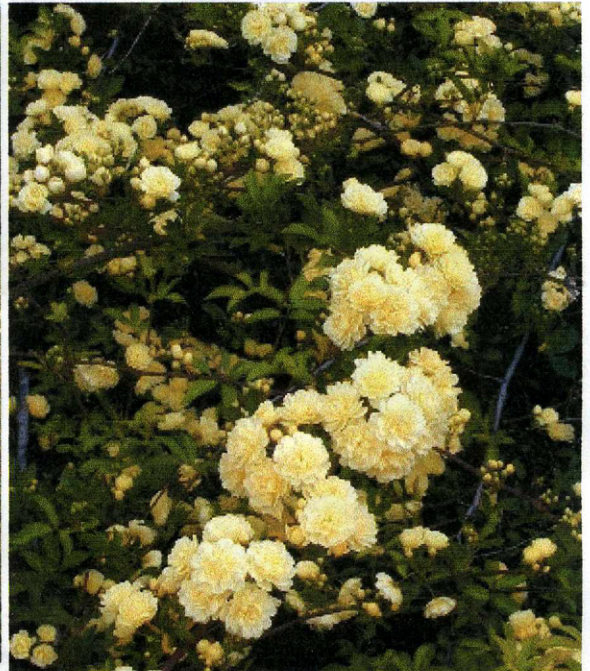
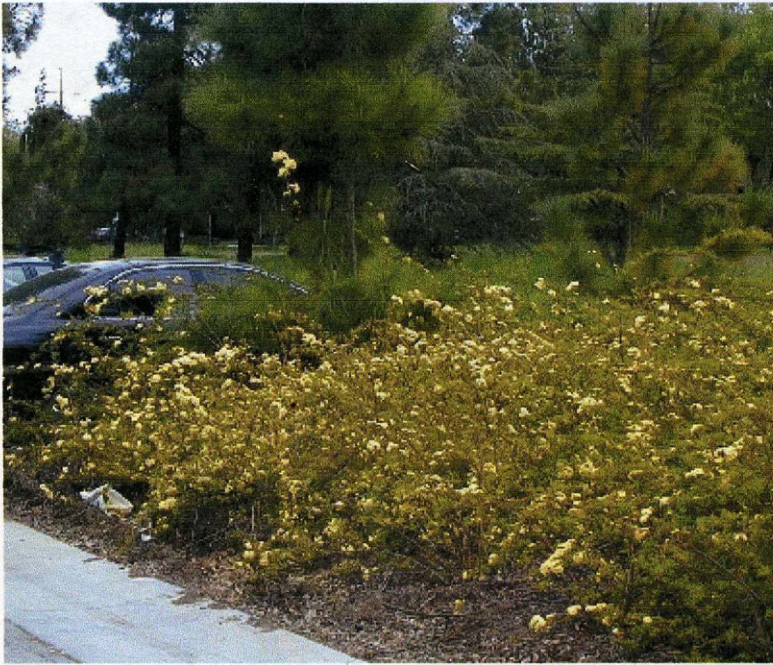


Genus: Rosa

Common Name: Lady Banks' rose

Origin: Central and southern China - from cliffs to streamsides

Kind of Plant: Vine

Seasonal Habit: Semi-evergreen

Growth Habit: Climbing

Height: 20 ft

Width: 20 ft

Light Needs: Sun-Part Sun

Water Needs: Low - deep monthly watering in 6 hottest months.

Special Identifying Features

Leaves: Alternate, pinnately compound, glossy, leathery, three to five leaflets each 2½" long

Bark/Twig: Thornless vining branches

Flowers: Large clusters of small yellow or white flowers 1" across in early to late spring. Some cultivars fragrant.

Fruit:

Disease(s): Almost immune to disease

(Refer to Disease and Pest Control chart for treatments.)

Pest(s): Aphid resistant

Special Points: Two forms sold are 'Lutea' (scentless double yellow flowers) and 'Alba plena' (violet-scented, double white flowers). Can be trained onto fences or arbors or as spreading groundcover.
